Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending March 10, 2017**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Staff facilitated Plan Commission meeting.
2. Two Wisconsin Election Commission webinar Spring Election trainings were attended by staff on March 7, 2017 and on March 8, 2017.
3. Associated Appraisal Consultants, Inc. and staff determined estimated dates for the revaluation process in 2017.
4. Staff replied to various media and campaigns on candidates for the Village of Fox Point Spring General Election.
5. Staff began to prepare election staff schedules for the Spring General Election.
6. Alcohol license renewal packets were mailed out to business entities early this week by staff.
7. Village of Fox Point audit work began with Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP, on Tuesday, March 7, 2017 with staff's assistance.
8. Staff testified in support of AB 27 regarding joint Health Department funding mechanisms.
9. Staff completed 2017 Capital financing needs review.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. DPW crews have spent the better part of this week removing downed trees from the windstorm on Tuesday and Wednesday. Roughly 15-20 Village trees were removed and we are anticipating a lot of yard waste next week as residents begin the cleanup around their yards.
2. Staff worked with a televising crew who was retained to televise some deeper storm sewer pipes as well as sanitary sewer lines.
3. Coordinated quotes for the replacement of the skylights at the Longacre Pavilion which will be on the agenda for the March Village Board meeting.
4. Three staff members attended Certified Pool Operator training and successfully passed the course.
5. Staff met with Michels Corporation, the low bidder for the Navajo and Seneca project, to discuss some preliminary logistics.
6. Received quotes for this year's EAB tree treatment and will make a recommendation to the Village Board for next week's meeting.

7. The annual DNR required NR 216 stormwater report was completed and submitted to the DNR. The report is also available for inspection at the library reference desk and at village hall. POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. On Saturday, March 4, 2017 at 7:49 AM, Officers responded to the Riverpoint Salons and Spa for a report of a Burglary. The interior glass doors were smashed causing \$6,500.00 damage. Several offices were ransacked. It is believed that nothing is missing from any of the salons at this time.
2. On Tuesday, March 7, 2017 at 1:57 AM, Milwaukee Police Department recovered the stolen vehicle which was taken from Cardinal Stritch on March 2, 2017. The vehicle was involved in a hit and run traffic accident at 25th and Hampton. No suspects are in custody.
3. On Tuesday, March 7, 2017 at 6:20 AM, Officers responded to the Milwaukee Jewish Community Center to assist the Whitefish Bay Police Department for the third bomb threat to the facility since the beginning of this year. The threat was emailed to the JCC overnight and was directed to the JCC personnel at around 6:10 AM. The campus was evacuated and several canine assets responded to the scene to search the JCC and the Milwaukee Jewish Day School building before the students arrived for the school day. The school day was delayed for one hour.
4. In response to the continued bomb threats to the JCC campus, Captain Dubnicka attended an emergency meeting with the Principals of the Milwaukee Jewish Day School, The Hillel Academy, and Jewish Beginnings. The three schools are housed within the Fox Point building of the campus. In response to this meeting, Captain Dubnicka was invited to a meeting with teachers of the Milwaukee Jewish Day School to discuss their concerns.
5. On Tuesday, March 7, 2017, Investigator Wichman attended a training seminar on Property Room Management presented by the Wisconsin Association for Identification.
6. On Tuesday, March 7, 2017, Officers responded to 7300 block North Crossway Road for a report of an animal attack. The resident stated on Monday, March 6, she found one of her small dogs injured in her front yard. She took the dog to the veterinarian and found it had bite marks to its neck and it also had a broken neck. The dog was euthanized. The resident did not see nor hear any attack on the dog and was nearby when the attack occurred.
7. On Wednesday, March 8, 2017, Officers responded to numerous calls of trees down across the roadway due to the high winds. In the 100 block of East Calumet Road, a utility pole was broke at its base, causing the power line to fall to the ground and causing the surrounding utility poles to lean towards the roadway. The roadway had to be closed for several hours until WE Energies could replace the poles and restore power. The response from the DPW was exceptional during this wind storm in bringing needed assets for traffic and prompt response in removing trees from the roadway.

8. On Wednesday, March 8, 2017, at 9:42am, an officer responded to the station for a report of identity theft. The officer met with a resident who advised their credit card had been used without permission. Resident also advised an attempt was made to open up an online payment account, without permission, but was unsuccessful. The investigation remains open.

Did You Know?

Gonorrhea is a common sexually transmitted infection (STI) that can infect both men and women. It can cause infections in the genitals, rectum, and throat. A recent report released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) states that the total combined cases of chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis reported in 2015 reached the highest number ever. There were nearly 400,000 cases of gonorrhea reported. There is a growing concern about gonorrhea becoming increasingly resistant to antibiotics normally used to treat it. The CDC currently recommends a combination gonorrhea treatment with two antibiotics – an oral dose of azithromycin and single shot of ceftriaxone. The CDC also mentions that STI programs have experienced budget cuts resulting in reduced access to care. Gonorrhea that goes untreated can cause complications such as chronic pelvic pain, life-threatening ectopic pregnancy, and even infertility.

How can STIs be prevented?

Providers: Make STI screening a standard part of medical care, especially in pregnant women. Integrate STI prevention and treatment into prenatal care and other routine visits. If treatment is needed, use the CDC recommended treatment guidelines.

Community: Talk openly about STIs, get tested regularly, provide education to your children as well as the community.

Individuals:

- **Vaccinate-** Vaccines are safe, effective, and recommended ways to prevent hepatitis B and HPV.
- **Reducing number of sex partners-** Reducing your number of sex partners can decrease your risk for STIs. It is still important that you and your partner get tested, and that you share your test results with one another.
- **Condoms-** Correct and consistent use of the male latex condom is highly effective in reducing STI transmission.
- **Mutual Monogamy-** Mutual monogamy means that you agree to be sexually active with only one person, who has agreed to be sexually active only with you. Being in a long-term mutually monogamous relationship with an uninfected partner is one of the most reliable ways to avoid STIs.
- **Abstinence:** The most reliable way to avoid infection is to not have sex.

Last week at the health department

Staff attended the Retail Food & Recreational Licensing Road Show. This annual Road Show is presented by the State Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to update local Sanitarians on current topics and changes in guidelines regarding the licensing of restaurants, hotels, pools and other establishments. The North Shore Environmental Health Consortium (NSEHC) is a program of the North Shore Health Department and is responsible for inspecting establishments in the North Shore. Each year NSEHC inspects over 250 establishments.

The Health Director/Officer is a member of the State/Local Operations Team. The group met last week to discuss emerging issues and improved communications between local health departments and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

The Health Director/Officer also attended the Partnership for Value-based Coordinated Care meeting. The group is working to explore the benefits of value-based financing for coordinated team-based care to Medicaid health providers, payers, and purchasers. North Shore participates in this group to examine opportunities for reimbursement for health department services.
